

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n this Southern California hilltop cottage, the decorating is all about the view. "Sea, sand, and sky," designer John Wooden says. "I wanted it beachy, but not trite." That meant choosing muted blues shaded with gray, instead of brighter royal or navy. "It's really a very neutral palette, with a lot of sandy beiges and whites for a soothing, relaxing feel," he says.

Classic furnishings and fabrics look coastal but not necessarily Californian. "I wanted more of an Americana
